II. Course Description and Objectives.

A. Description: Applied Calculus (3 hours).

A brief survey of calculus including both differentiation and integration with applications. Not to be substituted for MTH 229 or MTH 230.

- B. Objectives: This course will cover the basics of Calculus; theory will be minimized and applications will be emphasized. Upon completion of this course you will be able to:
 - (a) Theory
 - Identify and use functions appropriately.
 - Describe the main ideas of Calculus: derivative, integral.
 - Compute derivatives and integrals given a table, graph, or equation.
 - Read the assigned material responsibly.
 - (b) Applications
 - Mathematically model real world situations and interpret the results.
 - Use derivatives to maximize and minimize functions, including applications.
 - Explain how exponential and logarithmic functions are used in growth and decay models.
 - Use integrals to find area, including applications and probabilities.
 - Use a graphing calculator to solve mathematics problems.
- III. Calculator Requirement: You will need a graphing calculator for this class. I recommend a TI-83 or TI-84, if you don't already have a calculator. You must also have an MU computer account for email.

IV. Attendance Policy.

Attendance records will not be used to compute grades. Attendance will be taken everyday and missing class can be expected to significantly reduce your chances of success.
